Cardiff Steiner School are looking for a part-time Music Teacher to join the pioneering and passionate team in our Kindergarten to Class 12 (age 3-18) School.

The Music Teacher coordinates the Music programme for our students aged 6 to 18, including class singing and instrumental music instruction in pentatonic flute from age 6, and recorders from age 8. Musical notation and music theory is introduced from age 8/9. From age 8 children sing in choral groups and participate in instrumental ensembles. As they progress students work towards performing instrumental and choral compositions in performances, assemblies, plays and community events, throughout the year. We have several peripatetic instrumental teachers who visit the School and contribute to a vibrant, musical culture.

Job Description Music Teacher

Responsible to: The Music Teacher is one of a team of specialist Subject Teachers working in the Lower and Upper School Faculties - a team of Teachers carrying responsibility for the Lower School and Upper School. The Faculty work with the leadership and support of the Lower and Upper School Education Coordinators and Teaching Development Group. The position is accountable through the College to the Board of Trustees.

The primary focus of the post is to hold responsibility for music teaching and activity within the School, and to bring a strong and enlivened music experience to students within the context of the Steiner Waldorf curriculum.

Your duties will include:

- 1. To teach Music to our children aged between 6 and 18 years, which is appropriate to their age, and enables all pupils to recognise and achieve their potential.
- 2. To deliver a developmentally appropriate Music programme for the School that accords with the principles and methods of the Steiner Waldorf curriculum. Music teaching can be expected to include some or all of the following, and can incorporate a broad range of style and content, as appropriate to the age group:
 - singing independently and as a group
 - general class music-making, to include voice, rhythm, tuned percussion
 - recorder pentatonic flute playing and improvisation
 - the introduction of musical notation and music theory from Class 3 (age 8/9)
 - instrumental ensembles (building on students individual instrumental instruction)
 - supporting music in the Classes and School events as they progress students work towards performing instrumental and choral compositions in performances, assemblies, plays and community events, throughout the year.

We have teachers experienced and able to offer advice and support in working with the Steiner Waldorf curriculum, and can offer opportunities for mentoring and observation both at Cardiff and other Steiner schools, as well as external training and development.

- 3. To take overall responsibility for each class during Music lessons including:
 - Maintaining good discipline and creating a harmonious learning environment where pupils feel safe, happy and can learn effectively;
 - Ensuring good work and study habits are developed;
 - Implementing effective assessment and recording to identify pupils' progress and use this support all teaching and planning, in accordance with School requirements;
 - Ensuring the curriculum is appropriate and inclusive for all pupils, with effective differentiation and support that it is adequately monitored and evidenced;
 - Understanding teachers' responsibilities to pupils with ALN and taking ownership of their provision and progress within your subject, through inclusive and reflective practice;
 - Keeping appropriate records, plans and pupil files, in accordance with statutory and School requirements;
 - Liaising with the Class Teachers, Subject Teachers and other colleagues to develop a coordinated approach to curriculum and individualised learning;
 - Liaising with parents where required e.g. Parents Evenings;
 - Managing any subject specific learning environment to a high standard of safety, cleanliness and aesthetics;

- Organising/developing materials and resources for subject use and liaising with those responsible for purchase, keeping within an agreed budget;
- Participating in the admissions process for new pupils;
- Liasing with other agencies and professionals where necessary, and working effectively with support staff, Faculty, College, School Management Team and the Administration
- 4. To bring (or develop) an understanding of the Steiner curriculum, teaching method and the pedagogical principles that underpin them, and to renew this understanding through further study, on-going reflection and discussion of classroom practice.
- 5. To review and reflect on your own teaching practice and take part in the appraisal of your own work performance including , including observation and mentoring as required
- 6. To attend Teachers' meetings and other meetings as required.
- 7. To support the school's ethos, principles and objectives and contribute to whole-school activities and development.
- 8. To undertake appropriate preparation, study and training as necessary both for the effective delivery of the curriculum and to advance the school's ethos, principles and objectives. This may include participating in work, study and INSET days during school holidays or weekends, as required;
- 9. To develop an understanding of, and work within, the School's compliance and legal obligations, including The Independent School Standards Wales, and Welsh Government and ALN legislation and guidance
- 10. To be aware of and operate within the School's policies and procedures and to support their implementation including Child Protection and Health and Safety policies.
- 11. To provide break supervision and cover for colleagues, as required within contracted hours
- 12. Uphold the School's commitment to safeguarding children and young people.
- 13. Any other duties reasonably requested by the School. The job description is current but liable to variation to reflect or anticipate changes in the requirements of the post.

- A high level of musical knowledge and understanding including:
 - A strong and sensitive singing voice
 - Basic piano and/or guitar/strings skills
 - Ability to read and write out music
 - Confidence learning songs and stories by heart
 - Ability to teach recorder
 - Ability to play an instrument and teach musical concepts through it (without using technological means such as cd player or iPod)
 - Ability to teach singing independently and as a group
 - Ability to teach general class music-making, to include voice, rhythm, tuned percussion
 - Ability to support improvisation
 - Ability to teach musical notation and music theory from Class 3 (age 8/9)
 - Ability to lead instrumental ensembles (building on students' individual instrumental instruction)

- Ability to support and lead students performing instrumental and choral compositions in performances.
- Proven, successful experience of teaching music to children and young people
- A committed individual with an interest in Steiner-Waldorf education
- A joy and enthusiasm for working with children and young people, and an ability to relate to and inspire them
- An ability to maintain good discipline and behaviour with a consistent, firm but caring approach, and in interest in working with Restorative Approaches in creating and maintaining a positive learning environment
- An ability to plan and assess skills in order to support individual student's progress
- Good written and verbal communication skills
- An ability to communicate and cooperate well with colleagues and parents
- An ability to work in a small, close knit team, and willingness to work with colleagues in the continued development of the School and curriculum
- A positive and flexible approach to working in a pioneering context, and ability to work under pressure
- Excellent organisational skills, self-motivation and a strong sense of responsibility
- A track record of being punctual and reliable
- Suitability to work with children and a satisfactory enhanced Disclosure Barring Service
